AN INTERVIEW WITH TERRY HENRY

Do you remember when you first started at the Center? You were the very first person that was hired over 20 years ago.

TERRY: A friend of mine, a co-worker at my main job was doing some work for Dana Focks, so I started working for Dana Focks on the weekends. I think Dana Focks had offered him the position here at the Christian

Study Center at Pascal's, but he didn't take it, so that was a great blessing for me to start working here. A blessing throughout the years.

The first time I met Dr. Horner, I was here by myself, singing out loud, some Gospel song. He came down the stairs with a smile.

Singing lifts your spirits up, doesn't it?

TERRY: Yes indeed. The quality of this place, I love the serenity when I'm here by myself. But I enjoy being around the students and the staff and everyone just as much. It's truly been a blessing to me throughout the years that I've been here, and even a blessing to be here today talking with you. It's wonderful. It enlightens me, and it has helped me through some of the hardships that I've had.

You've had to deal with prostate cancer. It's got to have been a tough road with all you have endured going through those health problems.

TERRY: Like I say, being around people of this caliber, in this environment, that's really helped me through my bad days. I do have trials and tribulations but I try to go beyond that in some kind of way and I get a big lift from being here. The support that I get from everybody is wonderful. After I

> got out of the hospital, the Horner's offered for me to stay at their house for a couple of weeks. I thought that was real wonderful and caring, even though I didn't end up staying there.

But you have stayed at different times as I hear you have a special friend there.

TERRY: Oh, yes. Reggie [Reggie is the Horner's dog]. I came out to do

some work for them when I had a

government furlough. Reggie just really took to me- we have a wonderful bond. I enjoy taking care of Reggie when the Horner's leave town.

But like I said, I'm in a peaceful environment here at the Center and I have moral support. I get inspiration from everybody, the staff, the students.



You're such a positive presence. That helps all of us. You retired here, but are you still working at your main job?

TERRY: Yes, I'm still there. I've stopped counting at 35. I think I've been almost 40 years at USDA agriculture research.

Now that you've retired from working at the Center, have you had any time to rest or do anything special?

TERRY: I've been able to go see my grandkids and some of my family.

Can you tell me a little bit about your family?

TERRY: Yes. I was just visiting up there [Lake City] and my son - he has three kids. The oldest will be turning 18. During the time that my mom passed away, at her going away celebration, my grandson did a creative dance. And the grandson that is 13 wrote a poem for my mom. I was glad to have them there. And the youngest grandson, he's doing fine. They all do pretty good in school because their mom definitely pushed them beyond the sports. They love sports, but she let them know that their education is more than sports. Sports is okay, it has its place.

My daughter lives in Jacksonville. She was in the military and in Iraq. She came back with a lot of back problems and has a disability from the VA. She worked for awhile in the prison system, and when she was going to leave, the head guy didn't want her to since she's a hard worker. Now she's at FedEx.

I think hard work must run in your family! Terry, do you have anything else you would like to share with our readers?

TERRY: I believe in the golden rule, treating others as you would like to be treated. But sometimes it doesn't happen that way even when you try to treat people decently and with respect.

Terry, you've been a beautiful example of the golden rule to all of us. We are so grateful for the years you've been a part of Pascal's and the Christian Study Center.
